Description - The Great Plains Tribal Leaders Health Board (GPTLHB) has adopted the SCF READI Model—Reach Understanding, Establish Relationships, Assess Gaps, Develop and Implement Action Plan, and Integrate Solutions and Evaluate Results—as a culturally responsive framework for driving innovation and quality improvement in tribal health systems. This presentation will highlight how the READI Model was used to guide the implementation of an IHI-aligned diabetes management project, resulting in measurable improvements in clinical outcomes across Grea Plains tribal communities. Attendees will learn how the READI Model supports the progress of comprehensive care among American Indian and Alaska Natives. Cody Two Bears, a member of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, is the Founder and Executive Director of Indigenized Energy, an organization that blends Western science with Indigenous traditional knowledge to help tribes transition to renewable energy. Growing up in the impoverished CannonBall Community on the Standing Rock Reservation, where energy costs are among the highest in the nation, Cody was inspired by the #NoDAPL protests in 2016 to create North Dakota's largest solar farm on Standing Rock. At 26, he became the youngest elected tribal council member in Standing Rock history and helped bring President Obama to the reservation in 2013, where youth were empowered to share their stories.

Description - The Purchased/Referred Care (PRC) program at the Oyate Health Center (OHC) is a cornerstone of tribal health access, ensuring that relatives receive medically necessary services not available within the facility. This session will provide a detailed look at how the PRC department is structured and operated to meet the complex needs of tribal communities while upholding principles of sovereignty, efficiency, and compassion.

Land as Medicine_ Empowering the Next Generation Through Land and Culture......Prairie Rose 102

Description - Sahnish Survival Camp is a decade-strong, land-based youth program rooted in Sahnish (Arikara) ways of knowing. Description - The Program Sustainability Assessment Tool (PSAT) examines eight organizational and contextual domains in which grant-funded programs operate and offers strategies and tools for maintaining benefits and services over time In this workshop, participants will learn about the PSAT, how to implement it, and how to use the results to create a Sustainability Action Plan (SAP) for their programs.

Indians into MedicinePrairie Rose 101

Presenter: Dr. Daniel Henry

Description - The Indians Into Medicine Program (INMED) is a comprehensive program designed to assist American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) students who aspire to be physicians and other allied health care professionals. INMED provides academic, personal, social, and cultural support for students in grade 7 through graduate studies. To date, INMED has serviced approximately 300 graduating MDs, making the University of North Dakota School of Medicine & Health Sciences (UND SMHS) the number one institution in the nation for graduating AI/AN physicians. INMED has also, in its long successful existence, graduated more than 350 AI/AN health care professionals like Nursing, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Athletic Training, Social Work, Psychology, Radiology, and other health care degree programs.

Protecting First Nations Communities from Fentanyl & Drink Spiking ToxiShield™ —

Description - The presentation highlights the opioid and drink spiking crisis in First Nations communities, where overdose rates are 3–5x higher than average, largely due to fentanyl's extreme potency. It introduces ToxiShield™, the first all-in-one rapid test kit that detects fentanyl and major drink-spiking drugs in under 3 minutes. The focus is on prevention over response, offering a discreet, affordable, and culturally aligned solution. Tribal safety campaigns and branded community kits aim to empower self-reliance, protect cultural identity, and save lives at powwows, rodeos, and community events.

Mentorship Leadership: Building Capacity by Growing Your OwnPrairie Rose 103

Presenter: Dr. Duane Bedell

Description - This presentation explores the role of mentorship leadership in building institutional capacity by investing in alumni, community members, and internal staff as future leaders. Drawing from the experience of Bay Mills Community College, a tribally controlled institution, the session highlights how tribal colleges serve as models for 'growing your own' leadership pipelines rooted in culture, trust, and service.

Dakota Teachings - Culture is Medicine, Isnati "Coming of Age" CeremonyPrairie Rose 104

Presenter: Jean Nahomni Mani

Description - To promote good mental and physical health, to improve personal relationships and family goals on reproductive health. The traditional Dakota teachings of the "Isnati Awica Dowanpi" or Coming of Age ceremony, empowers persons to make decisions on family planning, spacing their children's births for healthy babies, or how many children to bring into their family. Young women and men need instruction on why family planning is necessary to make informed choices about their reproductive health. Open discussions on intimate or sexual relationships, personal hygiene education about HIV, other STIs, taking personal care of their bodies to be healthy and safe by understanding their sexual and reproductive health and rights.

Sticks and Strength_ Lacrosse as a Cultural Response to Youth Overdose and SuicidePrairie Rose 105
Presenter: Kevin DeCora

Description - The intersection of youth mental health, substance use, and suicide prevention requires innovative, culturally-informed approaches. This presentation explores how lacrosse—a sport rooted in Indigenous tradition—can serve as a powerful tool for prevention and healing among Native youth. Drawing from the Great Plains Tribal Leaders Health Board's Preventing Youth Overdose (PYO) and Connecting with our Youth (CWOY) suicide prevention initiatives, we examine how structured mentorship, cultural connection, and physical activity foster resilience and reduce risk factors.

"Small Space, Big Change": Low-Tech Mushroom Cultivation for Food SovereigntyHall A

Description - A demonstration and oveview of Low-tech Mushroom growing techniques indoor and outdoor and a discussion on the significance this can have in tribal communities and other food deserts.

Ronald McDonald House Charities of Bismarck owns and operates the Ronald McDonald Care Mobile of North Dakota. We have partnered with Bridging the Dental Gap, Inc. of Bismarck, a non-profit dental clinic, to establish the Ronald McDonald Care Mobile Program. We strive to deliver our services in an atmosphere of kindness, compassion, caring and respect.

Building Prosperity through Transportation: Unlocking Opportunities with the DBE ProgramPrairie Rose 102

Presenter: Kari Bullion

Description - Are you considering starting a transportation-related construction business (construction contractors, material suppliers, trucking and transportation services, telecommunications, environmental services, and manufacturers with capabilities in the transportation industry)? Or are you currently a certified Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) with the North Dakota Department of Transportation? This session explores how businesses can leverage the U.S. Department of Transportation's DBE Program to create jobs, generate local wealth, and build business capacity in the transportation construction industry.

Description - This presentation shares a personal and collective journey of healing, reclamation, and Indigenous leadership rooted in the land. In 2022, I began my healing journey through substance abuse treatment, which became the catalyst for reconnecting with my identity, culture, and purpose. That same year, I enrolled in a Sustainable Agriculture and Food Systems program, where I began to understand that healing myself and healing the land are deeply interconnected.

Description - Measles, a highly contagious viral disease, has historically been a major threat to Native American populations, worsened by long-standing healthcare limitations. Before widespread vaccination, outbreaks in these communities caused high rates of illness and death due to limited access to medical care and immunizations. This summary examines the epidemiology of measles among Native American groups, emphasizing public health infrastructure and intervention strategies. Examples show how historical events and a lack of federal support increased vulnerability. Recent efforts between tribal health services and public health agencies have successfully improved disease prevention. Understanding the historical and logistical factors behind measles transmission is key to developing effective health strategies and protecting our communities.

Description - This presentation illuminates the transformative power and promise of Tribal 638 initiatives in cultivating vibrant career pathways, nurturing Native talent, and strengthening communities. By weaving together ancestral wisdom and innovative solutions, we aim to honor tradition while forging new futures—empowering the next generation of Native leaders and professionals through opportunity, sovereignty, and service. This gathering will explore the significance of 638 programs in expanding self-determination, building capacity, and ensuring that tribal nations continue to thrive for generations to come.

Gitigaan Anishinaabekka - Many People's GardenHall A

Presenter: Andrew Blackbird

Description - "Gitigaan Anishinaabekaa" or "Many People's Garden" project is a community collaborative effort among the Indigenous Association, Gladys Ray Homeless Shelter and the City of Fargo. This presentation highlights the importance of community partnerships as well as the challenges and impacts of urban land stewardship. It also encompasses the importance of using native pollinator gardens as a tool for ecological education, that not only provides soil restoration but also helps to restore the individual by reconnecting them to the land.
